Scripture says:

"Do not be troubled if you do <u>not immediately</u> receive from God what you ask him; for he desires to do something even greater for you, while you cling to him in prayer"

Think about that for a few minutes. There are often times in our lives when God **doesn't seem** to be answering our prayers. We pray **repeatedly** for certain people or intentions, sometimes for days, months—and even years—but our prayers seem to go **unanswered**. When nothing seems to be happening, it is easy to feel discouraged and disheartened.

At these times, it is good to remember Jesus' words to his disciples,

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; **knock** and the door will be opened to you" Sometimes we have to just "**keep knocking**".

Whether or not we **think** God has answered our prayers does not change the fact that **God is a good Father who knows what we need.** Prayer should **not** spring solely from the fact that we **need** something, but from our **desire to strengthen our relationship** with God and to be **transformed** and conformed to his will in the process.

Occasionally, we might **not** receive an answer to prayer **immediately** because the **repeated action of prayer** will make us **grow** in some way: in **charity**, in **perseverance**, in **faith**. Our Father **knows** what we need **before** we ask him, but he awaits our petition because the dignity of his children lies in their **freedom**. We must pray, then, with his Spirit of freedom, to be able truly to know what he wants.

Perhaps we are praying for something that is **not** good for us or, even more likely, for something that is **not** *best* for us. Our prayers may be well-intentioned, and holy, but may only **partially** supply what we, or the people we are praying for really need. **Often we can only see part of the whole picture.** Our ways may not be God's ways.

An example of **perseverance in prayer** can be found in the story of **St. Monica**, **who prayed for her son**, **Augustine**, **for 17 years** before he was baptized and entered into the Catholic Church. **St. Monica is the patron saint of patience and perseverance**.

Keep knocking
